## Research Interests

My research focuses on Canadian and comparative federalism and on legal issues around human rights and freedoms. I've published numerous studies and scientific articles and co-edited a number of collective works on these topics in French, English, and Spanish. I have presented papers at over forty conferences as an invited speaker in Canada, France, Belgium, Spain, Venezuela, the US, and the UK.

## As Dean of the Faculty of Law

At the start of my first term as dean of the Faculty of Law, I led a strategic planning exercise to set priorities in education, research, strategic positioning, and the use of human, material, and financial resources within the faculty.

Six new research chairs were created at the Faculty of Law as a result of the 2014–2018 plan: the Goldcorp Research and Innovation Chair in Natural Resources and Energy (with funding from Goldcorp and Fasken Martineau law group) (\$1.2 million); the Legal Research Chair in Food Diversity and Security (with funding from Union des Producteurs Agricoles, five supply-management federations, and Financière agricole du Québec – Développement international) (\$1 million); the Antoine Turmel Chair on the Legal Protection of the Elderly (\$2.2 million); the UNESCO Chair on the Diversity of Cultural Expressions (with funding from the Coalition for Cultural Diversity, the Birks Family Foundation, Ministère de la Culture et des Communications, and Ministère des Relations internationales et de la Francophonie) (\$532,000); the Jean Monnet Chair on European Integration (with funding from the EU); and the Canada Research Chair in International Criminal Justice and Fundamental Rights.

A number of new faculty programs were also created, including six new short graduate programs and a new master's in notary law. Three new options for joint degrees were added for the master's with thesis program: with Université Paris-Sud (fundamental intellectual property law and digital technology), with Université Toulouse 1 Capitole (criminal law) and with Université de Bordeaux (transatlantic law). A short graduate diploma in legistics was also made available through distance education.
